

What Do TEEA Members Do?

Participate in monthly club meetings; enjoy fun and fellowship while they learn.

Caring for any necessary business at monthly meetings, an educational program is presented by the Extension Agent, a trained leader or guest speaker. Topics include anything the group wants to learn about.

Become rained leaders through workshops and educational opportunities offered at the county, state and even the national level. The County Extension Agent regularly conducts leader training for club members, who in turn, present the lesson to their respective club members.

Attend District, State, National and International Conferences where they meet people from other locales with a common interest in strengthening families. Workshops and educational seminars are presented at these events.

Support Extension Educational Programs. Some club members have joined other educational projects such as Master Gardeners, Master Naturalist, Master Clothing Volunteers and Master Money Management Volunteers. They use this additional training to become community educators.

Club members also support 4-H, the youth development program of Extension. Club members may lead project groups or serve as judges for contests. Extension Education Clubs provide scholarships for 4-H members: 12 at the state level, one at the district level, and one in the county.

Community Service. Extension Education Club members are interested in improving the life of all families in the community. Clubs and individuals have their own favorite projects.



BASIC RULES OF PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE

- 1. Always address the Chair (President) and gain recognition before speaking.
- 2. Every motion must have a second. (Members need not stand to second a motion).
- 3. The motion should always be re-state by the Chair (President).
- 4. There should be no discussion on a question until the motion is before the club.
- 5. To make a motion, the member shall say, I move that and not I make a motion.
- 6. A motion should always be voted on. Always take both for and against votes.
- 7. You stand when making a report or a motion, but may be seated during discussion.
- 8. The Chair (President) stands whenever addressing the club, but may sit during discussion.
- 9. The Secretary stands to read the minutes, but may sit while they are being discussed. She may check roll, rather than call roll.
- 10. Club members should not talk to others during business sessions or when leaders are giving programs.
- 11. A motion to adjourn is needed when all business is completed before the set time. If, however, the time for adjournment has arrived, the Chair (President) will declare the meeting adjourned by saying, The meeting stands adjourned.

PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY: Rules contained in Roberts Rules of Order Newly Revised shall govern the TEEABC in all cases to which they applicable.

TEXAS EXTENSION EDUCATION ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Texas Home Demonstration Association was organized in August, 1926 by 399 women attending a Farmer=s Short Course at A&M University. The primary purpose for organizing was to establish a scholarship for a deserving 4-H girl. This original scholarship of \$200 has grown to twelve given annually in the amounts of \$1,000. These scholarships are names: Maggie W. Barry, Helen H. Swift, Bonnie Cox, Claudia Williams, Edna W. Trigg, Lola Wheeler Smith and Florence W. Low, Jennie C. Kitching, Geraldine R. Zummer, Meatra D. Harrison, Janice Carter and Alby K. Peters.

Two \$300 Adult Career Scholarships were established in 1983 to be awarded annually, beginning 1984. A third was established in 1986, a fourth in 1990 and a fifth in 1992. The five scholarships were named for past presidents, however, in 1997 due to lack of funds only two scholarships were given. At present the two scholarships are named for the two past presidents. The 2002 Budget proposed that two (2) scholarships to be given at \$1,000 each.

In 1979, the organization changed its name to Texas Extension Homemakers Association, and in 1993 the name was changed to Texas Association for Family and Community Education and then in 2000 the name was once again changed to Texas Extension Education Association, Inc. The association=s board of directors is composed of the elected officers of TEEA, a director from each district of the Agricultural Extension Service, the Education Committee Chairmen, the appointed Parliamentarian and the Editor of the official publication.

The County Extension Education Chairmanship was established in 1948 as a connecting link between the clubs in the county and the state association through the director of the districts.

TEEA members receive these benefits:

- 1. Eligible to serve as delegate to county, district and state TEEA meetings.
- 2. Eligible for state TEEA association awards and recognitions for which they qualify. Examples: TEEA 50-Year and 60-Year member certificates, adult career scholarship, CVU recognition.
- 3. Eligible to apply for Adult Career Scholarships.
- 4. Have a part in providing twelve 4-H Scholarships annually of \$1,000 each.
- 5. Have a part in providing Adult Career Scholarships as budget allows.
- 6. Have a part in supporting 4-H work on the district level in all districts across Texas.

DUTIES OF EE OFFICERS

CLUB PRESIDENT/CHAIR:

Preside at all meetings.

Call meetings to order at the appointed time.

Appoint necessary committees.

Serve on the County Association.

A Form Management and Other Activities Tool - - Club Level is included in the manual for your use as you perform your duties as Club President. It is only for your use and is not sent to anyone else.

Complete the TEEA Membership List for Clubs form. Alphabetize the list by last name, and place a checkmark under New if the person listed is a new club member. Make two copies of the list and send them along with the dues to County Association Chair by October 1. Make the check for dues payable to the County Association. Use only this form for membership.

The **Education Program Award** at the District and State level is given to acknowledge those counties whose clubs have provided the best outreach on the State Education Recommended Programs. The **Honor Roll of Counties Recognition** at the District and State level is to recognize those counties who have made an outstanding contribution of time, energy and financial support to their communities in the name of TEEA. Complete the Club Monthly Report and give to the county Extension Agent - FCS each month to report to the State of Texas. This form incorporates the Education Program report and the Honor Roll of Counties report into one form.

Aggregate the Club Monthly Reports into one Club Annual Report and send to the County Association Chair by October 15.

Complete the following forms:

- * TEEA Application for 20+ years Member Certificate, which is due to the County Association Chair by November 1.
- * TEEA Application for 20+ years Club Recognition, which is due to the County Association Chair by November 1.
- * Texas Treasure Award, which is due to the County Association Chair by November 1.
- Texas Leadership Award, which is due to the County Association Chair by November 1.

Provide members with TEEA name tag information.

Appoint the Club Vice President or public relations officer to develop articles for The TEEA Messenger for the year. Dues dates are: February 1, June 1, and October 1.

Notify the State President of any qualified members who have been County Chair or Vice Chair for one year and wish to stand for District Director-elect. When presenting a candidate, a club must notify the State President and the District Director in writing, giving the candidates name

and qualifications. The endorsement must by signed by the Club President and Secretary by March 1.

VICE-PRESIDENT:

Take over the duties of the President in her absence. Preside when the President requests you to do so. Serve as Program Chairman. Automatically succeed the President in case she resigns or dies.

SECRETARY:

Keep the records and write the letters for the organization. Keep the list of the members and call the roll at each meeting.

TREASURER:

Receive all money paid the organization, arrange for its safe-keeping and pay bills.

ASSOCIATION DELEGATE:

Represent your club at association meetings, and report the association meetings to your club. When elected by clubs, club members give you authority to vote for the club=s best interest and promise to support your decision.

PARLIAMENTARIAN:

Parliamentary procedure is the etiquette of organization. Its purposes are to enable groups to reach conclusions and to plan work in a short time and without confusion. The parliamentarian should be familiar with simple parliamentary procedure in order to assist members with correct conduct of meetings.

HISTORIAN:

To collect, record and bring up to date the records of the club.

MEMBER DUTIES:

- * Attend all club meetings
- * Participate in club and county-wide activities
- * Recruit new club members.

DUTIES OF EE CLUB COMMITTEES

EDUCATION:

Plan exhibits that illustrate the methods of accomplishments of EE work. Develop plans by which EE work or some part of it, may be extended to people in the community. Keep people in the community and other EE clubs informed about the progress and activities of EE work.

FINANCE:

Plan the club's budget and devise ways and means of raising money. The budget and plans for making money are to be approved by the Club.

PROGRAM:

Be responsible for seeing that there will be a program each meeting. Assist the President in securing leaders for attending all training. Collect ideas and suggestions from the Club members during the year, and submit the list for developing plans for the Club Yearbook. Assist the Association in compiling the yearbook and be responsible for publication and distribution.

<u>4-H:</u>

Plan ways for adults to help 4-H members in individual and group activities. Furnish adult leaders for the 4-H program when needed.

RECREATION:

Provide a few minutes of recreation at club meetings and recommend plans for club and community recreational events.

TELEPHONE:

Assist the president and committee chairman in telephoning club members of meeting dates, places and additional information which is pertinent to all members.

Texas Treasure Award

The definition of a treasure is a person or thing considered precious or of great value.

The objective of the Texas Treasure Award is to pay special tribute to our grassroots members who have made a difference in their communities through their TEEA work. These members are the backbone of TEEA clubs, the silent workers. Many are content as members, desiring to hold no office. Others have held club and county offices and may have served on the Board of Directors.

Criteria

- 1. Must be a current TEEA dues-paying member for recognition.
- 2. Must be a grassroots member, nominated by his/her peers.
- 2. Is not currently serving on the State Board of Directors.

Selection Process

- 1. A club may nominate one individual, applying the above criteria, for the Texas Treasure Award and submit it to the County Association Chair by November 1.
- 2. The County Association Chair will select **one** Texas Treasure Award recipient for the county, based on the forms submitted by the clubs, and forward the selected individual's form to the District Director by December 1.
- 3. The District Director will select **one** nominee from the forms submitted by the County Chairs as the district winner and submit the nominee's form to the state President by February 1.
- 4. The Board of Directors will select one winner from the district nominees at the District Spring Conference.
- 5. Recognition will be given to the district winners present at the District Spring Conference.
- 6. Special recognition will be given to the Texas Treasure Award winner at the annual State Conference.

- 3. The District Director will select **one** nominee from the forms submitted by the County Chairs as the district winner and submit that individual's or team's form to the State President and the State First Vice President for Leadership by February 1.
- 4. The state Leadership Committee will select one winner from the district nominees submitted.
- 5. Special recognition will be given to the district winners present at the annual state conference.
- 6. Special recognition will be given to the Texas Leadership Award winner.

- 1. Afghans, Tablecloths, Bedspreads, Blankets, and Throws - knitted, crocheted, weaving, and tatting
- 2. Ceramics, China, Porcelain, and Pottery
- 3. Craft Painting - tole and decorative, stenciling - may include wood, metal, glass, fabric, and gourds
- 4. Decorated Garments - purchased or handmade - embellished or decorated with fabric, ribbon, trim, stones, and/or lace (clothing and accessories)
- 5. Fabric Creations - (must be made of fabric) - may include dolls, animals, baskets, pillows, braided rugs, door stops, crocheted rag rugs, etc.
- 6. Fiber Arts - crocheting, knitting, tatting, macrame, and spinning - may include clothing, doilies, scarfs, and other small items
- 7. Garments and Accessories Handmade - sewing
- 8. Handstitchery - needlepoint, crewel, embroidery, candlewicking, smocking, and counted cross stitch
- 9. Machine embroidery
- 10. Holiday Decoration - any holiday, any medium
- 11. Jewelry -- may include beads, clay, paper, shells, stones, watercolor, and wood
- 12. Painting and Drawing - watercolor, oils, pastels, and charcoal
- 13. Paper - may include note cards and pages
- 14. Traditional Scrap Booking
- 15. Digitally Produced Scrapbooks
- 16. Photography - black and white, and color
- 17. Quilts - smaller than 50 x 70 - Hand Quilted
- 18. Quilts - larger than 50 x 70 - Hand Quilted
- 19. Quilts - smaller than 50 x 70 - Machine Quilted
- 20. Quilts - larger than 50 x 70 - Machine Quilted
- 21. Quilts Any Size - Hand or Machine Quilted - constructed and quilted by more than one member
- 22. Recycled items - any medium
- 23. Wall Hanging - any medium
- 24. Miscellaneous (items that do not fit any previous category)

Rules - - Cultural Arts Exhibit

- 1. Only TEEA members are eligible to enter the exhibit categories. TEEA members are those who have paid state dues in a timely manner. **Dues must be paid before entering on any level.**
- 2. Kits will be allowed.
- 3. Only one item per person may be entered in each category.

- 4. Each county will hold its own elimination and may send the first and second place winners in each category to district competition.
- 5. Each district may enter only the first place winner in each category for state competition for a maximum of twenty-four(24) per district.
- 6. Each article must be the work of the TEEA member or members, if applicable, displaying the work, said work completed during the past year.
- 7. Type or print the description of each article on the TEEA Cultural Arts Form (sample form on page 6-34; forms for duplication on page 6-35 of the State manual), and attach the form to the article. Entries will not be accepted unless this information is already attached at the time the item is checked in for competition. The County Association Chair and the District Director must sign this form.
- 8. For District competition, County Chairs should send a list of Cultural Arts County winners to the District Director following county competition.
- 9. For State competition, District Directors should send a list of Cultural Arts District Winners to the Host District Cultural Arts Exhibit Chair following district competition.
- 10. Each winner is responsible for getting exhibits to and from the district and state competition.
- 11. Each winner should provide their own materials to exhibit the articles. Tape and nails cannot be used on the walls.
- 12. Entries will be exhibited by category.
- 13. Neither the district nor the state will be responsible for any lost, misplaced, or broken items. We do not anticipate any misfortunes, but this disclaimer must be clearly understood by all exhibitors.
- 14. Hostesses will be on duty at all times.
- 15. Each entry must be judged at the state level in the same category it was judged in at the county and district levels.
- 16. Judges will judge entries in each category and award a first, second and third place ribbon. If the judges should decide that no entry deserves a ribbon, they have the option to award no ribbons.
- 17. The form attached to each item **must** be folded so that only the category number, category name, and description can be seen by the judges.
- 18. Judges will consider the following criteria:
 - A. Paintings, hand painted china, ceramics, jewelry, holiday decorations, craft painting, paper and traditional scrapbooks:
 - Originality
 - Artistic appeal
 - Technique
 - Execution
 - B. Fabric creations, fiber arts, hand stitchery, decorated garments, quilts, handmade garments and accessories, quilts, wall hangings, afghans, machine embroidery, and recycled items:
 - General appearance
 - Workmanship
 - Beauty and design
 - Color harmony
 - C. Photography and Digital Scrapbooks
 - Originality
 - Content
 - Clarity
 - Technical competence
 - Composition
 - D. Miscellaneous items to be judged on criteria related to the medium.
- 19. Best of Show item will be selected by the judges from the first place winners.
- 20. The County Chair will complete the Cultural Arts Winners form for Counties and send to the District Director 30 days prior to the District contest.

Coins For Friendship

TEEA delegates at the 1988 State Convention voted to buy a room equipped for the handicapped at the new Leadership Lodge at the 4-H Center in Brownwood. The pledge was for \$20,000. A check for the final payment on our pledge was presented to Lynn Copeland, Director 4-H Center, at the 1991 State Conference. What a tremendous example of what our combined efforts (coins and dollars) can accomplish.

In 2000-2001, members pledged \$6800 for canoes and storage rack at the 4-H Center in Brownwood. This one year pledge was paid at the 2001 State Conference.

In 2001-2002, members pledged \$6300 for 4-h Adventure Trek Equipment. This one year pledge was paid at the 2002 State Conference in Amarillo, Texas.

In 2002-2003, members pledged \$6300 for the 4-H Aquatic, Shooting Sports, and Sport Fish Equipment Program. This one year pledge was paid at the 2003 State Conference in Plano, Texas.

In 2003-2004, members pledged \$6000 for a concrete pad, tables and chairs, a covered roof to support new storage container and outdoor programming equipment. This one year pledge was paid at the 2004 State Conference in Abilene, Texas.

In 2004-2005, members pledged \$6000 to be given to repair sailboat and to purchase additional. This one year pledge was paid at the 2005 State Conference in Waco, Texas.

In 2005-2006, members pledged \$4100 to be given to purchase picnic tables to be placed in various locations at the 4-H Center, and diving boards. This one year pledge was paid at the 2006 State Conference in Lubbock, Texas.

In 2006, the State Conference voted for all Coins for Friendship funds will be used for the Texas 4-H Center AWish List@ items, as determined annually by the TEEA Board of Directors.

In 2006-2007, members pledged \$4500 to be given to purchase a swimming pool slide for \$2500, a kiln for \$800; the remaining balance will go toward Mission Possible Sponsorships at \$100 each.

In 2007-2008, members pledged \$5000 to purchase a steam kettle for \$4000, 8 hand-held radios for \$400 total, a marine band radio for \$300, and a table dolly for \$300.

In 2010-2011 members pledged \$5000 for kitchen equipment (deep fryer/cooker) at 4-H Center.

In 2011-2012 members pledged \$5000 for room furniture in the lodge at 4-H Center.

In 2012-2013 members pledged to renovate/room furniture for a dorm room at the Texas 4-H Center.

In 2013-2014 members pledged \$5000 which went towards an industrial kitchen mixer.

In 2014-2015 members pledged \$5000.

In 2015-2016 members pledged \$5000 for a canopy for rock climbing area.

In 2016-2017 members pledged \$5000 for purchase of chairs for the dining room.
